Denouncing political violence: learning from Parshat Pinchas

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Political violence has long been a tragic part of our history. Four of our presidents have been assassinated. Presidents Reagan and

Trump were fortunate to survive attempts that led, respectively to the crippling and eventual death of James Brady, Reagan's press secretary, and firefighter Corey Comperatore, an attendee at the rally where Trump was targeted. Dr Martin Luther King Jr.; Medgar Evers; civil rights activists Andrew Goodman, Michael Schwerner and James Chaney; Malcolm X; Robert Kennedy; San Francisco Supervisor Harvey Milk and Mayor George Moscone; anti-racism activist Heather Heyer ... the list of victims of political violence goes on and on.

Recent examples of the frightening resurgence of political violence include the near-fatal beating of Paul Pelosi, the husband of then-Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi; the arson attack on the home of Pennsylvania Gov. Josh Shapiro; the murder of UnitedHealthcare CEO Brian Thompson; and

the violent throng on Jan. 6 2021, that chanted “hang Mike Pence” during an assault on the U.S. Capitol that led to the deaths of at least five people.

Then there are the events of the past month. Our High Holy Days cantorial soloist, Holli Berman, regularly walks in Boulder, Colo., with a group demanding the release of the hostages in Gaza. Thank God she was not with them in early June when they were attacked with an incendiary device, which led to the hospitalization of some of her friends. This was followed less than two weeks later by the murders of Minnesota state Rep. Melissa Hortman and her husband Mark, and the attempted murders of state Sen. John Hoffman and his wife Yvette. I spent the following days checking in with friends and colleagues from my years in Minneapolis. As you can imagine, everyone was deeply shaken.

Parshat Pinchas, which we’ll read in mid-July, tells the story of Pinchas, a zealot who killed two people whose intimate relationship he disapproved of. Torah praises Pinchas, but many of our rabbinic commentators are not convinced. They deplore the lack of due process afforded his victims and wonder why Pinchas did not consult Moses or others before taking action. These interpreters caution that such actions lead to vigilantism and chaos.

If we cannot come together as a nation to denounce political violence, then we have to take a serious look at why. Our sages’ disapproval of Pinchas teaches a timeless lesson. It does not matter how frustrated we are, how provoked we might feel, how justified we believe ourselves to be. Murder can never become our means of expression.

When I reached out to Minnesota Secretary of State Steve Simon, a fellow confirmand at Temple Israel of Minneapolis, to ask what we can do to help, he replied, “Turn down the political rhetoric.” In the coming weeks, I will be working with community partners to organize a rally against political violence to which leaders from both major parties will be invited to participate. Please follow your TAI emails for updates on this effort. I will keep Steve’s words to heart by keeping my critiques of elected leaders and other public figures laser-focused on differences of policy and devoid of personal attack.

May we join together in denouncing violence as a tool of political dissent. May we reject the horrific example of Pinchas and the killers who have followed. May we take control of anger and outrage before it takes control of us.

Who knew? I fit right in Torah Study

“Go to the Rabbi’s Saturday morning Torah sessions? No way! I’ll look stupid.” However, in reality, the suggestion was a good one. I enjoy reading about my faith. I like to learn in small groups. And my favorite part of services is when Rabbi Wirschafter explains the weekly Torah portion and its relevance to us today. Why would I refuse?

My husband and I joined TAI almost three years ago. I have participated in workshops, activities and events, and made wonderful friends. Our temple has become a real home for me. Why was I intimidated to try a new activity?

I am aware that, typically, synagogue members can be divided into the doers, for example, those who volunteer in the kitchen for multiple events; the administrators like board members who keep the temple running; and the learners who are at various levels of their understanding about Judaism and want to read and discuss the Torah, the Parshat, and/or the Mishnah. Throughout my Jewish journey, I have had the opportunity to participate happily in the first two roles and hope to continue to do so at TAI. However, the third role has always eluded me. Why on earth wouldn’t I take advantage of the chance to finally do so?

The answer is simple: I didn’t think I would fit into the Saturday Torah study. I had heard its participants were all scholars, they had significant experience with sacred Jewish texts, and perhaps my status as a beginning learner would be a detriment to the group. In other words, yes, I’d feel stupid.

But after being insecure for too long, I decided to gather my courage, admit my ignorance, and try Torah study at least three times. If I ended up feeling like too much of a dunce, I gave myself permission to be otherwise engaged on Saturday mornings. However, the first time I went was amazing, and I’ve been going ever since. The regulars have welcomed me unreservedly; I am comfortable enough to ask a bunch of questions and contribute my thoughts.

Rabbi Wirschafter, who leads most of these sessions, provides selections from ancient and contemporary sources that explore that week’s Torah portion from different perspectives. The discussions include comparing the portion to other Jewish points of view and our own experiences. I am not only developing a better understanding of Judaism, but I also am getting to know these wonderful temple members better.

As it turns out, I’m not too stupid to attend Torah Study. It’s become one of my favorite things to do at TAI. I hope others who are also curious but insecure try coming, too. Every person adds a unique voice regardless of their Jewish knowledge. Let me be the first to welcome you!

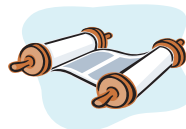
KOLLEL STUDY GROUP

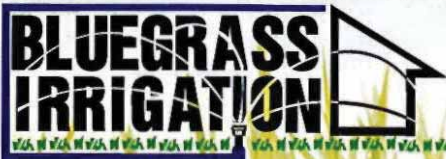
