According to tradition, Hanukah, among other things, is an annual "second Sukkot." Due to the cruelty of oppression, The Temple in Jerusalem was either closed off or ritually unsuitable for use. At least one festival of Sukkot went uncelebrated during this terrible time. After the war, when the Maccabees reclaimed and rededicated the Temple, celebrating a "make-up" Sukkot was a top priority.

One should be careful with analogies. The Wirtschafter-Sippy residence is no temple, and our busy fall calendar was no war, but the inability to offer people the kind of Sukkot they expect is a commonality between ancient legend and modern Lexington. For two years running we enjoyed welcoming everyone to our home for a Sukkot open house. This autumn, the schedule was simply too packed to do it. Fortunately, Hanukah, along with its status of second Sukkot, gives us the perfect opportunity to make it up to you.

Please join on us on Tuesday, December 19, from 7 to 9:30 p.m. for our Hanukah/Second Sukkot Open House at our home, 1131 Richmond Road. We look forward to celebrating the holiday with you, so please consider this your personal invitation.

We tried something new for our Sukkot celebration this year; instead of building a Succah and using it in the evening, we had a day time celebration featuring the Etrog and Lulav ritual plus a feast of grilled vegetables, and whatever else people brought to share. The event was held on a Sunday afternoon in a public park on the banks of the Danube, in a section of the city where many Jewish families are living. Adam Komaromi, one of our new Board memers, ran the grill with his family helping out. It all took place in a space partially closed in on three sides by tall bushes, and open to the sky, like a Sukkah. Besides our own members and a large group of foreign visitors who just happened to learn about the celebration from our website, a large crowd of neighborhood kids gathered to learn how to shake the lulav.

To have enough room for the festival crowd in which to celebrate Simchat Torah, we again borrowed a room from our Unitarian friends, who had hosted us for Yom Kippur. Our two new and very active Board members, Peter Arvai and Adam Komaromi, were honored by being named as the Bridegrooms for the reading of the last and first verses of the Torah, restarting the annual reading cycle. But before they could be called up to the Torah for their Aliyahs, they first had to receive their Jewish names (in Hebrew). And since she had never received one when young during the communist era, Adam's mother also got her Jewish name that evening, to complete Adam's Jewish name. All in all, it was a joyous and moving occasion. And of course, after the reading of the Torah, everyone had a chance to dance with it.

On a more practical and serious note, the process for our getting the use of some city-owned real estate to use as a synagogue is moving ahead at a very ponderous rate of speed. The request for bids for the flat we hope to get will be issued in the next couple of weeks. The bids have to be made, evaluated, and finally a decision rendered on whose bid is accepted. Since the property has been vacant for almost 10 years, we hope that ours will be the best or even only bid. So cross your fingers for our success. Getting these fine premises would be a big step forward for the congregation.

I'll close with another good bit of news. Diane Senechal, a member of B'nei Jeshurun congregation in NYC, has moved to Hungary for two years to teach in Hungarian schools. She is trained to leyn the Torah, and has offered to leyn for us at our Torah services. This will add greatly to the beauty of our services. And since B'nei Jeshurun is famous for the beauty of the music in its services, we're hopeful that Diane will teach us some of the tunes used there in chanting the prayers. We also like a very musical service, and are always eager to learn new melodies.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

The greatness of our congregation comes from our volunteers: Temple members who selflessly spend their time and resources to take care of many of our synagogue's needs, big and small. They help out on special occasions; they volunteer for critical activities; they serve on our Board of Directors; and they join the often thankless work of our Temple committees.

Of all of our committees, the Endowment Committee plays a unique role. These five Temple members serve 10 year terms as the fiscal stewards of our congregation's future. They also have the delicate task of developing and implementing an investment strategy that maintains a long term financial safety net, while at the same time producing income to assist our congregation's immediate needs during tough economic times.

A few decades ago, the development of investment strategies was not too tall a task – bank certificates of deposit were available at high interest rates, meaning that substantial income could be generated at virtually no risk to the Temple, and with only minimal effort. But in recent years, that paradigm changed, and successful investment strategies involved buying stock, bonds, mutual funds, etc., etc. This required sophisticated analysis, and a considerable time commitment.

And yet, our Endowment Committee met the challenge with great vigor, and a deep commitment to their task. Our endowment funds now exceed \$4 million, a very healthy backstop for a congregation of our size, that generates invaluable income to help us through an era where Reform congregations across the country are struggling financially. In recent weeks, the Endowment Committee has begun to explore the notion of hiring an outside investment adviser to manage our funds. This will obviously impose a new cost, but the hope is that the professionals can develop a low-risk strategy that generates even more income for the Temple's short term needs and long term safety net.

In the middle of this transitionary period, we are losing two very dedicated members of the Endowment Committee: Brian Hershinow and Steve Auer, the latter who has done double duty as both the Chairman for the last 5 months and as Treasurer of the Committee. While we are so grateful for their service and will miss their energy, I am confident that the newly constituted Endowment Committee will serve us well. Rob Rosenstein, Samye Miller Stith, Aaron Yelowitz, Michael Marx and Garry Hoover represent a diverse set of talents and abilities to lead these efforts. What they all share is a deep devotion to the future of Temple Adath Israel.

I will keep you updated on their progress, but if you have any suggestions, please don't hesitate to contact me.

Join us for an engaging discussion of Joseph Bau's memoir "Dear God, Have You Ever Gone Hungry?" on Sunday, February 11, at 1:30 p.m. at the Eastside Library Conference Room.

In a memorable scene in the film Schindler's List, viewers witnessed the clandestine marriage of two Jews in the Plaszow concentration camp: Joseph and Rebecca Bau. Joseph Bau's memoir includes stories, poetry, and drawings detailing his time during the Holocaust including the bombing of Krakow, the brutality of the concentration camps, and his experiences as #247 on the men's section of Schindler's List. With artistic irony and elegance, Bau balances the grimness of Holocaust events with the humor and resiliency that helped him and his wife survive.

Following the war, Bau became an artist, author and Israel's first animator. Exhibitions of his work have appeared in Israel, Canada, and the U.S.

An exhibition of his work is scheduled in April in Lexington as a part of the Jewish Community's celebration of Yom Ha'Atzmaut and Israel's 70th birthday.

Copies of the book are available through major booksellers and third-party sellers. JFB may have a limited number of copies available for purchase as well. 
