The Summer of What?

Marked by voter registration efforts, attempts to end segregated interstate travel, church burnings and the murder of three civil rights workers, the summer of 1964 became known as Freedom Summer.

Marked by growing anti-war sentiment and the counterculture, the summer of 1967 became known as the Summer of Love.

Marked by the murder of Heather Heyer and injuries suffered by dozens of demonstrators and counter-demonstrators at a white-supremacist rally, and a resurgence in church burnings, the summer of 2017 became known as the Summer of Hate.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Thank you for allowing me to serve TAI

It was gratitude for Temple Adath Israel that motivated me to join the temple board eight years ago. This congregation helped Pete and me teach our children what it is to be a Jew, making them proud of their heritage and giving them a lifetime of wonderful memories. As a Lexington transplant, I found the community I sought at TAI and made dear friends (many now departed) who represent,

for me and my children, the people we should strive to be. Still, I was a reluctant board recruit. Like many of you, my schedule was stretched thin, and I worried that the business of running a congregation might take the glow off the peace I felt in our sacred community.

As my term as president comes to an end, I hope I have succeeded in giving something back to the Temple. Even so — and contrary to my expectations — what I have gained from board service far exceeds what I have given.

Support. As an American, I long for our country to feel like a place where we all are pulling for one another. We're not there yet . . . But at TAI, for every bump in the road, a kind, forbearing and skilled partner jumped in to help.

Encouragement. There are so many reasons *not* to try something new. Absent encouraging partners, it's easy to talk ourselves out of the effort involved. I have found TAI to be a culture of "Yes!" receptive to new ideas, with willing partners.

Confidence in my congregation. It has been famously said that respect for the political process decreases as knowledge increases about "how the sausage is made." But knowledge of

the inner workings of the temple has deepened my respect. The generosity of so many with their time and financial support is humbling. The fact that, even in a crisis, our rabbi, staff and lay leaders are guided by Jewish values rather than insecurity or discord is inspiring.

Deepened appreciation for Jewish life. You all have inspired me with the time you devote to living a Jewish life through prayer, studying Torah, helping others, teaching, cooking, singing, honoring the memories of your ancestors, and helping those in the TAI and Lexington communities. As just one example of those that touch me weekly: today I attended a Zoom meeting in which a child of this congregation helped his students in a genealogy class trace their U.S. relatives back to shtetl roots and towns that otherwise could be lost in time as nations fall and borders shift.

Thank you for the privilege of serving Temple Adath Israel as president. I am excited for the coming year and our opportunities to work with my friend, mentor and role model Pat Shraberg as she leads us into a future that looks bright, even in the midst of a pandemic.

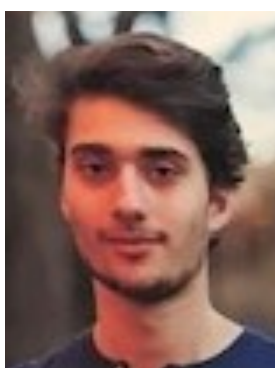

There've been some changes made



A long-planned remodel of the office at Temple Adath Israel was completed in May. The redesign and work were done by KPC Architectural Products, owned by congregants Angie and Jonathan Smith. After everything was moved out of the office, the side walls were painted light gray; the back wall is blue-gray. The same colors appear in the carpet tiles and seating. The administrator's cubicle was reconfigured, with the long wall (top right) moved back so it's now between the windows. To make up for the loss of space, the cubicle was widened, and the work space redesigned (bottom right). The front office has a larger footprint, with a second workspace (above) and more chairs (bottom left) for visitors. Most of the old storage units were incorporated into the redesign.

we enter the weeks and months ahead are: What kind of summer do we expect to have? What kind of summer do we want, and what are prepared to do about it?

Our experience of a thing does not always live up to expectations, but without expectations we might end up with experiences that do not benefit anyone. The Rev. Dr. C.B. Akins Sr. of Lexington's First Baptist Church Bracktown has warned that "if youth are not engaged, they can become enraged." I would take this a step further and substitute *people in general* for the word *youth*.

Despair is a strange condition. We need enough tenderness to acknowledge its presence and ask for help, while maintaining enough toughness to get through it without falling apart. Each of us has a different threshold for pain, but there is only so much pain that each of us can take.

During this summer and the months to follow, we have to remain engaged

as a congregation and as a community. Many, if not most, of us can keep ourselves and our children engaged in meaningful pursuits even if it is not the way we are used to working or the summer activities we had planned. Other people are not as fortunate. Millions of people no longer have paychecks coming in or savings they can draw from.

Now that school is out for the summer, many young people from underprivileged homes will not have contact with teachers or others who provide additional support. It is essential that we do not stumble into the pitfall of "out of sight, out of mind." Just because we don't see the suffering of others with our own eyes does not make it any less relevant or less real.

In *Pirke Avot*, our tradition teaches "according to the effort is the reward." There are exceptions to that rule, of course. Horrible things happen that no one could have foreseen and that no one deserves. But the persistence of unfairness and suffering does not give us license to make an excuse without making an

effort. We have to make a serious and sustained effort to help young people find alternatives to boredom and bad choices. Please join us in supporting the Boys & Girls Club, YMCA, Family Resource Center/Youth Services Center of Fayette County Public Schools, and the Blue Grass Community Foundation in making sure that our young people find creative and constructive things to do in a summer of limited options. The medical necessity of social distancing is not to be confused with taking a holiday from social justice.

This summer will be named one day for what we made of it. Our choices — the way we allocate our time and resources — will determine how it will be defined. May the decisions we make and things we do lead to this summer earning a name we can be proud of.

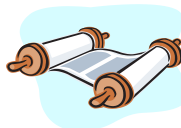
KOLLET STUDY GROUP

FUND FACTS

Over the years TAI congregants have established funds to support specific programs or for specific purposes. Each month, FUND FACTS will present a snapshot of a fund to familiarize congregants with TAI's resources.

In 1994, Judge Samuel Rosenstein created the Rosenstein Family Fund in memory of Harriet Rosenstein and in honor of Rob Rosenstein's installation as TAI president. Subsequently, Irv and Irma Rosenstein, their children and families, and friends have supported the fund with very generous gifts.

The fund provides means for temple members, with special emphasis on young children and youth, to participate in Jewish and Jewish-related activities through programs offered by or in conjunction with the temple. Most recently, the fund supported Religious School, the Torah Restoration Project and the Purim carnival presented by LexTY, TAI's high school youth group.

Expenditures of the income are guided by the Rosenstein family. As of Dec. 31, the fund had a balance of \$201,037, of which \$43,703 was accumulated income.
