The centenary of women's suffrage

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Throughout last summer we were treated to the brilliant work of Rabbi Carol Belin, Ph.D., using the Book of Numbers as a prism through which to look at the history of American Jewish women in the fight for suffrage and related struggles. Now, as we make our way through the Book of Genesis, we pick up the conversation for the better part of a week leading up to this historic election and the centenary of American women casting their first ballots after ratification of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution.



The work week and the Sabbath immediately preceding the Nov. 3 election are when we read the Torah portion *Lech-Lecha* (meaning go forth), where we

Parenting discussions focus on helping young children, teens cope during pandemic

Temple Adath Israel, Ohavay Zion Synagogue, Jewish Family Services and PJ Library are joining forces to present a series of conversations on Parenting During Pandemic: Supporting School-Age Children and Adolescents Through the Unique Challenges of COVID-19.

The discussions will be led by Miriam Silman, Paula Mertens of Jewish Family Services, and Rabbis Rachel Sabath of OZS and David Wirtschafter of TAI

The session for parents of children pre-K age through fourth-grade will be Sunday, Oct. 18, from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Other sessions will be Thursday, Oct.

22, from 8 to 9:30 p.m. for parents of children in fifth through eighth grades; and Sunday, Oct. 25, from 3 to 4:30 p.m. for parents of high schoolers.

The discussions will offer parents a way to understand how the changes and challenges of COVID-19 related to school, friends, routines and life in general affect youth and families. Strategies will be provided to help children manage challenging transitions, emotions and behavior. Ideas for how parents can address their own stress also will be offered. Participants will be encouraged to ask questions, share ideas, brainstorm

together, and think about how Jewish parenting traditions and frames may guide us in the present moment.

Silman, who has a master's degree in social work, is administrator of the Trauma Informed Care program for the state Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities, and co-director of Kentucky Project AWARE. She has focused on trauma for more than 30 years, working as a clinician, trainer, researcher and policy advisor. Throughout COVID-19 she has consulted about the psychosocial effects of pandemic to state government agencies, hospitals, outpatient providers and residential facilities.

Moosnick lecture topic: Jewish women's early activism



Dr. Melissa Klapper, left, author of the award-winning book "Ballots, Babies and Banners of Peace: American Jewish Women's Activism, 1890-1940," will be the featured speaker for the 2020 Moosnick Lectureship in Judaic Studies.

The lecture, hosted by TAI, Ohavay Zion Synagogue, Transylvania University and Lexington Theological Seminary, will be at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 27. A post-lecture discussion will be at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 28. Zoom links will be sent via TAI email.

Klapper, a professor of history and director of women's and gender studies at Rowan University in Glassboro, N.J., won the 2013 National Jewish Book Award in Women's Studies for "Ballots, Babies and Banners of Peace." It focuses on the involvement of Jewish women in the first wave of the suffrage, birth-control and labor movements.

Her lecture coincides with the 100th anniversary of passage of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, giving women the right to vote. They cast their first ballots in the Nov. 2, 1920, presidential election.

Klapper received a bachelor's degree from Goucher College in Towson, Md., and a doctorate from Rutgers University in New Jersey.

are introduced to Sarah, the first of our four founding matriarchs. Like the women who lead the suffrage moment, Sarah experienced tremendous hardships, endured terrible mistreatment and overcame towering obstacles to achieve her goals. Her life, like that of American Jewish women centuries later, was marked by challenge, crisis and change.

Our lineup of female Jewish scholars includes local and out-ofstate talent focusing on the legal, historical and social implications of this pivotal moment for our nation. On Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 27 and 28, we will hear from this year's Moosnick scholar-in-residence, Dr. Melissa R. Klapper. Her topic will be "Ballots, Babies, and Banners of Peace: American Jewish Women and First-Wave Feminism." While we wish we could bring her to Lexington to speak, we are fortunate she will be engaging with us via Zoom. (See story above.)

At services Friday, Oct. 30, we will have the privilege of listening to Dr. Karen Petrone, a TAI congregant and history professor at UK. She will

share her perspective on women's suffrage and what the struggle to gain the ballot can teach us today as progressive Jews seeking to meet the challenges posed by the #MeToo movement and the disproportionate socioeconomic impact of COVID-19 on women and minorities.

Our study sessions on Saturday. Oct. 31, will feature two more female scholars from our community. UK law professor and former TAI president and Religious School director Jane Grise will lead the 9 a.m. session. She will discuss how our courageous ancestors used lawsuits, protests and other avenues to achieve social change, and what we can learn from them. The 11 a.m. session will be led by Dianne Bazell, Ph.D., a former TAI treasurer, past president of Lexington Hadassah and, like Karen, a member of Shir Adat.

May the strength and determination of biblical Sarah and the Jewish women who played vital roles in the battle for suffrage inspire us to continue working for the day when no one will be deprived of equal rights and opportunities based on gender or treated like a second-class citizen because of their sex.







FUND FACTS

Over the years TAI congregants have established funds to support specific programs or for specific purposes. Each month, FUND FACTS will present a snapshot of a fund to familiarize congregants with TAI's resources.

Stanley and Phyllis Scher honored their son Larry by establishing a fund in his memory in 1997. When their second son. Bob. died 16 years later, they added his name to create the Larry and Robert Scher Memorial Fund for Educational Travel. The original purpose of the fund was to provide "a means for participation in the Annual March of the Living held in the State of Israel, in Poland, or elsewhere, or such other educational travel to the state of Israel or elsewhere."

Over the past decade, the fund has been used to underwrite the Confirmation Class trip to Washington, D.C. Only income may be expended from this fund. As of December 2019, the fund had a total balance of \$51,279, with \$15,597 in accumulated income.
