




Hanukkah's proper place

This year, the approach of Hanukkah presents us with an irony. The Maccabees reclaimed the Temple in Jerusalem in the month of Kislev. They arranged a belated Sukkot festival as there hadn't been one at the proper time because the temple was under Greek-Assyrian control. Among the lesser-known names for Hanukkah is "Second Sukkot." Both holidays center around the complicated role of place and the blessing of having a home. During Sukkot, living in booths for eight days reminds us of our history of wandering and how long it took to reach the Promised Land. Lighting candles for eight nights for Hanukkah reminds us of the dedication it takes to maintain a place we call home.

have been driven from our houses of worship, not by a foreign army but by a ferocious virus that has disrupted how we live and taken more than a million lives worldwide. In a Hollywood ending to the pandemic story, there would be a dramatic reopening on Hanukkah. Unfortunately, it's not working out that way in the real world. It is still unsafe to enter our building en masse. Yet Hanukkah still has the power to bring us together and rededicate ourselves to the people and places we love.

The Maccabees had no guarantee of when the war would end, and we don't have any promise as to when this pandemic will cease. Our forebearers left us with profound lessons for maintaining our faith. Absence, banishment and exile from a place do not define what it means to us. Long separations from those we love do not constitute lack of devotion. The fact that you are not "going to Temple" does not demonstrate that Temple is gone from your heart. Our people have overcome such crises in ages past, and we will overcome the one we

are facing now.

Everything needs to be put in place, including the importance we put on place itself. Hanukkah's holiness is not diminished because we cannot celebrate it at Temple. Houses of worship were never intended to be the only place where religious life is housed. The proper place for Hanukkah is wherever you make a place for it. Just as God is everywhere, Judaism is everywhere.

This pandemic need not and should not keep you from seeing fellow congregants and remaining Jewishly engaged. The fact that a health crisis has closed our doors does not mean that our religious priorities are on hiatus. This edition of the bulletin, along with the fliers and emails we are sending, is filled with ways to interact with one another. Whether what moves you is music, prayer, Torah study, adult education social action, spinning dreidels or eating latkes, the opportunities to remain connected at this time of overwhelming disconnectedness are there for the taking.

May we make the most of Hanukkah. May its candles increase our light. May its miracles strengthen our hope. May its message renew our resolve.

summer scholar-in-residence a few years ago, and has read and taught Glück's work in a variety of settings.


Among Glück's poems, Lewin cites

FUND FACTS

Over the years TAI congregants have established funds to support specific programs or for specific purposes. Each month, FUND FACTS presents a snapshot of a fund to familiarize congregants with TAI's resources.

In 2017, the Cerel, Phillippi and Suhl families created the Skuller-Cohen-Cerel Fund to honor the memory of the generations that preceded them in Lexington. The purpose of the fund is to ensure the education of future generations of children at Temple Adath Israel. The fund pays for the curriculum materials each year for Religious School and "provides for the needs, acquisitions, expenditures and other related uses in support of the Religious School."

The fund, which allows for the expenditure of principal and income, is directed by the Cerel, Phillippi and Suhl families. As of Dec. 31, 2019, the fund had a balance of \$24,970, with the last expenditure a year ago.

If you use your phone number at the register, call 1-800-576-4377, then select option 4 to get your Kroger Plus card number.


