Five years ago I would not have pictured myself writing this column. Yet here I am, Temple Adath Israel president. I can't think of a greater honor; without a doubt, it is one of my finest achievements.

I know you might have a lot of questions about me. Who am I? What makes me the right person to serve as TAI president? When I was asked to take the presidential mantle, I asked myself that very question. At first, I didn't have an answer. So I put on my boots and left the house. I spent an hour and a half in nature, hiking a trail and pondering whether this was the right path for me, and whether I was worthy of helming our congregation, whether I was worthy of you. Both of my grandfathers came to the United States from Germany for the obvious reason, with my Great-grandpa Sam emigrating from Russia for a similar reason. They, along with my grandmothers, taught me about the importance of hard work and family. Through them, I have my Jewish identity. Some of my favorite memories revolve around the obvious, such as birthdays, but also holidays like Passover as our family sat down at the table and celebrated our heritage with prayer, food and laughs.

So what brought me to Lexington? Law School, with the intent of heading back to Louisville upon graduation. Then, in 1996, during my second school year, I met my now-wife Angie, and my plans changed.

So who am I? I am a blessed man who was born lucky. Not everyone has the family life I have and have had. Not everyone gets to go to college, have a fantastic career and good friends. Not everyone gets to live my life.

I recognize that my success has not just been a product of hard work, but of luck, luck to have been raised in a family that nurtured me in both the secular and religious worlds, luck to have a wife who pushes and prods me to be a better man, luck to have friends like you who have helped me establish a Lexington Jewish identity. Now, as TAI president, it is my honor to be able to repay all those who have been an important part of my life. It is my time to give back to my Jewish community.



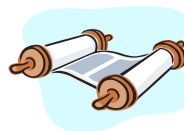
KOLLEL STUDY GROUP

blessed. We realize this does not mark the end of parenting, but it does conclude a portion of the journey. In August we will have been married 25 years. How Shana has put up with me for so long is a mystery I will never fully comprehend. What I do know is that transitioning into another demographic, that of empty nester, puts us in the same category as the majority of our congregation. That is to say we are more like most of you than we were before.

Generation X, widely considered those born from 1965 through 1980, are in our 40s and 50s now. Some of us are not only empty nesters but grandparents. We have something of a mixed reputation in the world of not-for-profit Jewish life. Generally speaking, we waited longer to get married and have children than our parents did, and we followed that up

by having fewer children, taking longer to join congregations (if we joined at all), and donating less money and time. Of course, there are notable exceptions that should not be overlooked. Many of my fellow Gen Xers, both at TAI and beyond, have stepped up in every way possible. Two of our last three presidents are Gen Xers as is our current president, Rich Orenstein. But the painful truth is that as a group we have underperformed when it comes to congregational life. So, we will continue to gently encourage Gen Xers to participate more frequently in programs, serve on committees, join the board and find other ways to become more active in our congregation. Rather than criticizing Gen Xers, we invite you to share your ideas and suggestions with us. How could we serve you better? What could we offer that might be of greater interest to you?

As to the new club I am joining, those of us whose chicks have flown

the coop, I look forward to gaining a sharper understanding of how TAI could improve and expand what we provide for those like us. We put such a heavy emphasis on passing down Judaism to our children that we sometimes forget to take a healthy portion for ourselves. The approaching year will take me from a professional interest to a personal stake when it comes to what it feels like to be an empty nester. I welcome input from all of you in this group in helping TAI leadership assess how we can serve this demographic even better.

As we begin the process of a careful reopening after closing our campus more than a year ago because of the pandemic, the time is ripe to reflect and reimagine what we can do in person and online. Let us seize the opportunity and be sure to make the most of it. As Torah teaches: "This is the day that God has made. Let us be glad and rejoice in it" (Psalm 118:24).

Over the years TAI congregants have established funds to support specific programs or for specific purposes. Here's information on our newest fund.

At its meeting in May, the TAI Board of Directors officially approved creation of the Marty Solomon Fund for Jewish Youth Experiences and General Fund Purposes. Seed money came from a \$200,000 bequest from congregant Marty Solomon, who died in February 2020.

This is an unrestricted fund, and all the money, including future earnings, may be spent provided it is used for any lawful purpose allowed by temple bylaws, rules and regulations, and the allocation is approved by the board.

The board is aware of Marty's interest in supporting Jewish youth, and it intends to direct a portion of the fund to ensure that happens.
