Repeat after me: Some words bear repeating

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



The Book of Deuteronomy, which we began again in early July and remains the source of our weekly portions through late September, is known in Hebrew as *Devarim*, meaning words, laws or things. The Greek meaning of Deuteronomy, however, is "second telling." It is a fitting name because much of the text is focused on repeating history and laws that we have encountered in prior books.

We moderns tend to have negative associations with repetition. Phrases like, "You're repeating yourself," "You sound like a broken record" and "This song/book/argument/film etc. is repetitious" convey limited patience with hearing something more than once. Our rabbis approached repetition with a very

How do you grow stronger? Eat right? Go to a gym? Do pushups? All of those work. But they don't work for a temple. A temple grows stronger only through strong members. TAI is full of fascinating and exciting people, and I got to meet them in part due to the temple's committee system.

different perspective. Ayn l'shon yetera, "Thereis no such thing," they admonish us when reading Torah, "as extraneous speech." If something is told to us more than once or with more than the least number of words, there is a reason for it. For instance, "Justice, justice shall you pursue (Deuteronomy 16:18) is deliberately repeated to teach us that we not only are commanded to seek just ends but to do so only by just means. Or going back to the moments before Jacob wrestles with the angel, the text tells us he was "scared and terrified" (Genesis 32:8). Again, our

sages say this is not an example of superfluous speech or poor editing. Rather, the meaning is that Jacob was scared that Esau would kill him and terrified that he might have to kill Esau.

In an age that has turned efficiency from a technical advantage to an imperative, we would do well to approach repetition — and even seeming repetitiousness — with the open-mindedness of generations past. Some things bear repeating. Maybe people keep saying them because we have not gotten the message yet. Maybe they are being repeated because we missed the nuance the first few times. Maybe something is being repeated because some of us

were not able to learn right away the skill, technique or method being demonstrated.

Torah, like much of our existence, is indeed repetitive at times. We cannot control that. What we can control is our attitude, response and outlook on repetition. If we are looking for efficient narrative and straightforward guidance, then Torah might well frustrate us. But if we take the time to appreciate multiple perspectives on the same subject, much like a skilled novelist expands our thinking by giving us different narrators of similar events, then repetition can help reveal the wonder, fascination and awe of Torah and life itself.


