as 5 are getting their shots. Students are back at school. Many if not most of us are back at the office.

Yet it seems that since the assault on the U.S. Capitol in January we are more divided than ever as a nation. Vaccinations have succeeded in protecting our bodies, but they have exacerbated our bitterness and divisiveness. Who would have thought that getting a shot, something that used to be routine, could become so contentious? That which should have given us the ability to reengage with people who don't think as we do pulled us further apart. Separation anxiety normally means the fear of

detaching ourselves from those we love. In the case of COVID, we have seen the growing anxiety that occurs when we are separated from those we loathe. Resentment, distrust and anger between the vaccinated and unvaccinated continue to grow even as the number of people getting shots continues to rise. Rather than being grateful, relieved and optimistic, it seems we are ever more susceptible to being bitter, fearful and frustrated.

Thanksgiving and Hanukah represent opportunities for us to readjust our mindset and reframe our outlook. As we approach three-quarters of a million deaths due to COVID-19 in the United States, most of us have lost someone. If we cannot coalesce in the joy of a

vaccine, then perhaps we can unite in the enormity of loss. Even the Montagues and Capulets managed to do that. May their memories be a blessing, and may our sense of common loss remind us to keep working for the common good.

We are so happy to be back worshipping together and hope to bring back our monthly family Shabbat dinners in January.

Just before COVID-19 hit, TAI's Religious School began to collect plastic caps and lids to turn into a bench for the temple's garden. The lids piled up as congregants diligently dropped them off in the bin at the front entrance.

Now that we can gather again with precautions in place, it's time to sort, wash and weigh our collection.

Starting in January, there will be sorting sessions on Sunday mornings and at other times so we can go through every bag and box of caps and lids to make sure they comply with the guidelines set by Green Tree Plastics, a company in Evansville,

While this started as a children's project, it has been expanded to allow much-needed adult participation so we can put the project on the fast track.

Based on the amount of lids we have, we expect to have more than enough for the bench and possibly another item or two. 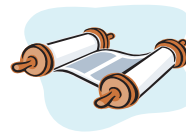
KOLLEL STUDY GROUP
