A homegrown rabbi returns home (and no, I'm not talking about me)

Fifty years ago this spring, Rabbi Sally J. Preisand became the first woman to be ordained as a rabbi by a major seminary in North America. Last month we celebrated this occasion with a congregational seder led by Rabbi Jennifer Lewis of Xavier University. This month we are honoring it by hosting Rabbi Melinda Mersack as our speaker for Sisterhood Shabbat on May 20. To the best of my knowledge, Rabbi Mersack is the only person to become a rabbi who has been consecrated, bat mitzvahed and confirmed at our congregation. I can think of no one

better suited to reflect on where we have been and where we are going in terms of gender equality than someone who knows our congregation and our movement so well.

While there are many reasons for joy, this milestone is also an occasion calling for somber reflection and critical assessment. Yes, we can be proud of what women have accomplished in the rabbinate. We should be grateful for the spiritual, intellectual, pastoral and social justice contributions

Growing together in the temple garden

Now that Passover has passed, I'll be planting my pepper garden. I'll plant a few other things, but Angie and I love spicy foods. We'll plant 8-12 pepper plants of differing variety and heat levels. And around the

beginning of August, we'll have peppers for frying, drying, eating raw and for my buddy's hot sauces. Gardening for myself, Angie and our friends is wonderful. Gardening for those in need—and to teach our children the benefits of gardening—is a gift. TAI has the gift-givers!

How many of you know that TAI has a huge garden plot behind the parking lot? Until two years ago, I didn't know we had a garden. If I had, I wouldn't have realized that it is a residential lot with no residence. Go take a look! It is TAI's own self-contained Garden of Eden, minus the snake and the apples. There is even a little bit of the garden in our Temple, as many of the seeds used in the garden are sprouted indoors. Almost all of the harvest goes to those in need, with regular donations to the Hope Center and Bob Brown House, and some crops (the beets in particular) have been used by TAI on Rye and for food festival offerings. Thanks to 10 or so regular and semi-regular volunteers, nine of whom are TAI members, the temple is making a difference in the fight against hunger. So how did the garden begin, where are we today, and how can you and your children help? I'm glad you asked.

Two weeks ago, I was doing some upkeep near the garden. Inside the garden, Jo Stone and Anne Banks were doing prep work. Mickey Hernandez was turning compost. Then a group of Religious School students showed up and started working under Jo's direction. They were so excited to plant seeds and proud of the weeds they pulled. Do you remember pulling weeds as a kid at your father's direction? I do; I hated it. These kids loved it. After they left, another set of Religious School students showed up. They were just as excited and happy. After Religious School ended for the day, Jo and I talked about the garden and how important it is not just to our Jewish community but to our Lexington community. Since then, I have talked to Jo and others about the garden's history and importance.

2009 was the magic year. Jane Gris , a past TAI president who was then Religious School director, had returned from a conference and approached Jo Stone about incorporating gardening into the curriculum for the 2010-11 academic year. Jo agreed and asked to use the vacant lot the temple owns on North Hanover Avenue. Originally, Ashland Elementary School and TAI Religious School students worked on the garden. In 2011 and 2013, TAI applied for and received sustainability grants from the

city. The money was used to install the garden's raised beds. In 2012, Jonathan Miller, one of my predecessors as temple president, donated some of his winnings from finishing 8th at the World Series of Poker to pay for fencing and install a spigot on site that replaced 300 feet of hose from the temple to the garden. Today, TAI volunteers and Religious School students do most of the garden work, with the bulk of the load falling on our volunteers. There are thoughts of increasing the number of beds, thereby creating more produce resulting in an even greater mitzvah, but that can't happen without your help.

As noted, nine of the 10 regular volunteers are TAI members. Some, like Mickey and Jo, have been there since the beginning or close to it. Others like Anne are more recent volunteers. But

tending a garden the size of ours takes a lot of work, and our folks need help! In addition to adults, children are welcome to volunteer. For example, Sophie and Eli Hoffman work in the garden as part of their b'nai mitzvah project. Whether or not your children have a bar or bat mitzvah coming, this is a great way for them to participate in a wonderful project. If you or your children, or both you and your children, are interested in lending a hand, let Jo (ljstone2473@gmail.com), Anne (annebanks510@gmail.com) or one of our other excellent volunteers know, and they can help you get started.

Weather permitting, the garden crew will plant warm-weather crops such as tomatoes, peppers and squash at 10 a.m. Sunday, May 15. Volunteers also are needed to help water the garden on a regular basis.

they have made. But we cannot ignore realities such as the pay gap, sexual harassment and lack of advancement that have been tolerated for far too long.

It is fitting that Rabbi Mersack, a daughter of our congregation, has selected the Daughters of Zelophehad as the text on which to preach. The dramatic passage in the Book of Numbers tells the story of a family with five daughters but no sons whose patriarch has died. The daughters go to Moses to petition to inherit a future land holding in Israel. Until this point, the practice had been for this asset to go to a brother or closest male relative of the deceased. God and Moses grant the request but with a significant caveat. Daughters can inherit land only if they marry within their tribe. It is a perfectly imperfect passage for our moment. The daughters bring their protest forward in a law-abiding and constructive manner. A male invested with the authority to convey God's will then defines how much progress actually will happen. In a manner all too reminiscent of the work-versus-personal-life conflict of modern women, the biblical ruling

imposes limits on whom women may marry if they want to assert their financial rights. The story is a clear-eyed example that the road to progress is never perfect or without pain. Intense conflict and disturbing compromise are part of the process. Rabbi Mersack's presentation will be in the form of a midrash, her own rabbinic reimagining and interpretation of the biblical story.

Please join us for what promises to be a powerful service and a profound speaker. Rabbi Mersack's remarks will be followed by a brief question-and-answer period. You may send questions in advance to me (rabbiiw@lextai.org) or to Sisterhood President Elissa Weinstein (taisisterhoodpresident@gmail.com), and we will try to incorporate them in the conversation. May this year marking half of century of women in the rabbinate and 100 years of bat mitzvah inspire us to keep working for a world that respects women's rights, values women's work and celebrates women's achievements.

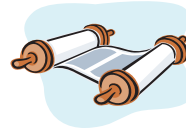
