Guest protocols for the High Holy Days

Based on security concerns due to the divisive times in which we live, TAI will be welcoming congregants and guests for services during the High Holidays as follows:

Guests accompanied by a congregant do not have to pre-register for services.

Unaccompanied guests must preregister by contacting the office to put their names on the guest list for each service they want to attend. When they arrive for each service, they must show a photo ID. If they don't do so, they will be turned away.

TAI has not issued tickets for HH

services for several years, and we do not charge admission. Guests are welcome to make a donation if they wish, but are not required to do so.

Entry for all services will be through the office door, as has been our protocol in recent years. Congregant greeters will meet you there. Other TAI security greeters will be located throughout the building, in addition to a police presence for all services.

Whether you are a congregant or guest, please do not be offended if the greeter asks for your name when you arrive. Not all our greeters know all our congregants, even those who have been TAI congregants for 30 years or more. We will be checking names against the congregant list or the visitor list. We wish we didn't have to do this, but it is necessary to achieve our goal of creating a safe worship space.



TAI hosts voter forum for at-large council race

TAI is hosting a Lexington chapter of the League of Women Voters candidate forum at 7 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 27, for the at-large race for Urban County Council.

There are six candidates on the ballot. The top-three vote-getters will serve four-year terms, and the top vote-getter also will become vice mayor, succeeding Steve Kay, who must step down due to term limits.

The candidates are:

- James Brown: He has served on the council since 2015 as District 1 representative.
- Chuck Ellinger: He is seeking his third at-large term; he was a district representative from 2003-2014.
- Bill Farmer Jr.: He is former council member who served District 5 from 1997-2006 and 2011-21.
- Richard Maloney Jr.: He is seeking his third at-large term; he previously served seven terms representing District 11.
- Lillie Miller Johnson: Running for an at-large seat for the second time, she has been elected to and served for more than a decade on the Fayette County Conservation District.

Registration, voting deadlines

Tuesday, Oct. 11, is the deadline to register to vote at the county clerk's office (by close of business), online (by 4 p.m.) or by regular mail (Oct. 11 postmark). Requests for mail-in absentee ballots may be submitted Sept. 24-Oct. 25; they must be returned by mail or left in designated drop boxes by 6 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 8, which is Election Day. In-person, excused absentee voting will be available Oct. 26-21 and Nov. 1 at designated sites. Early in-person voting (no excuse required) will be Thursday, Nov. 3, through Saturday, Nov. 5, during designated hours. Polls will be open on Election Day from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. local time.

■ Dan Wu: The first-time candidate is a community activist and restaurateur.



The last time we gathered in our sanctuary for the High Holy Days was in 2019. With the exception of Shir Adat members and/or Torah readers, we have been without congregants in the building on the holiest days of the year for the past two years. The sanctuary was not the same without you. Worship was not the same without you. This year we will be back in our sanctuary, and we need you back, too. There are good reasons for attending virtually. We have not and will not

pressure those with health and safety concerns to put themselves or others at risk. What we are asking is that those of you who can attend in person to please make the effort to do so. The time invested in getting to and from Temple will be rewarded by the quality of interaction while you are here. Everyone who attends in person enriches the sense of connection and community for everyone else.

This renewed emphasis on attendance extends beyond the High Holy Days to the entire year. Shabbat services are more lively, participatory and engaging when

you are here with us. We know you and your families live busy lives with many obligations. Our request is that you include increased service attendance among your new year's resolutions, to make it a higher priority than might have been possible in the past two years or so. Lightning fells TAI's rooftop star — again

They say lightning doesn't strike the same place twice, but the iconic Star of David on the roof above the temple's historic entrance to the sanctuary, top left, was felled by lightning on Aug. 4, the second time that has happened in less than 20 years.

The first time was in the mid-2000s. It was replaced as a gift from Emanuel Gilpin and Gilpin Masonry Construction in

Midway; he saw it as an interfaith act of kindness. According to the company's website, it "worked with a stone carver to duplicate every detail with Indiana limestone. The building was just not complete without it."

The August strike split the



star's base in half; the star fell backward onto the roof but was largely intact, above. Some of the roof's clay tiles also were damaged. On Aug. 30, workers from Kidwell Roof Construction lifted the star off the roof with a crane, middle left, then lowered it into the courtyard and maneuvered it, bottom left, into one of the garden beds, bottom right.

Insurance, less the temple's deductible, is covering more than half the cost for removing and replacing the star, plus replacing the fire-alarm system that was damaged by the same storm.
