Passover, Yizkor and joining the club

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

My long-time friend Ori Weisberg and I have a lot in common. We were born on the same day just two years apart. We attended the same schools. We played the same instrument in the same orchestras. We went to the same

congregation. When Ori's father died exactly one year after mine, he turned to me at the end of the funeral and said, "This is not the club I wanted to join you in." That was 18 years ago. Fast forward to the present day, the spring of 2023/5783, and Shana, with whom I have shared most of my adult life, has joined the club of losing a parent. She never wanted to enter the ranks of membership, and I was not looking forward to welcoming

her into this society. There are plenty of good things we share. We do not need the loss of a parent to have one more thing in common.

There is a practice that those who have *not* lost a parent, spouse, sibling or child should recuse themselves from Yizkor, the memorial service held on Yom Kippur and during Sukkot, Passover and Shavuot. You might recall that on Yom Kippur we offer those who are not strictly obligated to attend this service the chance to leave the sanctuary and return for Neilah. Even when she accompanied me in my student pulpit days almost 30 years ago, Shana would quietly depart for Yizkor. To be clear, in Reform congregations this is entirely a matter of choice. One should remain in the sanctuary or recuse oneself from Yizkor based on what one thinks is appropriate. I've always respected Shana's interpretation that Yizkor is for





direct mourners. Now, with the death of her mother, Roni Sippy, Shana will be with me, with us, in the sanctuary for Yizkor, in the club no one wants to join. There is the old joke about "never say never." A similar logic holds true for the use the of the word *always*. "It is always good to see you" does not apply to circumstances such such as funerals, shiva minyans, yahrzeits and Yizkor. Yizkor will be more meaningful with Shana in the room, but I wish she did not have a reason to be there.

It is poetically fitting that the first Yizkor Shana will observe for her mother is that of Passover. They loved making matzo ball soup, macaroons and other Pesach specialties together. As a therapist and


an academic, they enjoyed the robust discussion, interpretation and analysis that makes the seder so compelling. They delighted in hosting one another along with family and friends, whether we were at Roni's place in Berkeley or wherever the rabbinic journey has taken us over the years. Like life itself, the Hillel sandwich, combining *charoset* and *maror*, asks us to accept the bitter with the sweet. So, too, we can be happy for having loved ones in our lives while being sad there are some who no longer are with us.

Generally speaking, with the exception of Yom Kippur, Yizkor is commemorated with our friends at OZS. Whether you are obligated strictly speaking to attend the service or think it fitting to be there to express your support for those who are, consider making communitywide

Yizkor a part of your Passover and festival observance. This year, the Lexington Jewish community's Passover Yizkor will be at 9:30 a.m. Thursday, April 13, at Ohavay Zion Synagogue. Like Passover and the journey of life, Yizkor contains multiple and sometimes conflicting truths. It is a club no one wants to be part of, yet the presence of every person makes the pain of our loss a little easier to bear. When we prioritize Yizkor, shiva and yahrzeit, we fulfill multiple mitzvahs. These solemn rituals honor the memory of our departed and allow us to comfort one another in times of grief. May the sadness of Yizkor increase our appreciation of Pesach, and may the joy of Pesach alleviate the sadness of Yizkor.
