Lag B'Omer: eating, learning, a walk in the park

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



David Wirtschafter According to custom the 33rd day of the Omer (the 49 days between Passover and Shavuot) is to be celebrated with hiking, eating and Torah study. The name of the holiday, *Lag B'Omer*, comes

from the alpha numeric equivalent of its two letters: Lamed (the I sound) is 30, and gimel (the g sound) is three. The reason for hiking is that the study of Torah was prohibited by the Romans, so students needed a pretext to be wandering the hills in search of a scholar. Hunting or going for a hike provided a convenient cover story that was hard to disprove, especially if you were carrying bows and arrows. As for the eating element, Jews in Israel who represent the entire spectrum of observance fill the public parks on Lag B'Omer for the grilling event of the year.

In addition to the weekly Torah portion during the omer, the rabbis encourage us to study *Pirke A vot*: Sayings of the Ancestors. *Pirke A vot* is neither focused on narrative like Torah nor committed to legalistic detail like the Talmud. Rather, its short entries offer observations on how to find greater joy, meaning and fulfillment in life. Hillel's famous question, immortalized in song by Debbie Friedman, "If I don't stand up for me who will, but if all I care



about is me, what am I?," is taken from *Pirke Avot*.

Lag B'Omer is fairly consistent with the joke about the three-part structure of Jewish holidays: "They tried to kill us. They failed. Let's eat." But it departs in some significant ways from the script. Instead of "they tried to kill us," it's closer to "they tried to frighten us out of Torah study. Instead of "they failed," it's closer to "the ban didn't stop all of us." Instead of sitting down at a table for break the fast or seder, it's closer to "let's bring a picnic or fire up the grill."

Please join us at TAI at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 9, for our own version of *Lag B'Omer*. We will begin with a short walk from TAI to the Henry Clay Estate. People may bring Frisbees and footballs if they like, or

simply enjoy the trees and flowers on the grounds. You also may meet us at the Henry Clay Estate to make the walk a bit shorter. When we return to Temple, we will fire up the grill with burgers, including a veggie option, and hot dogs. Then we will study a few passages of *Pirke A vot* or modern texts in a manner that is accessible to participants of all ages. A nice walk, eating and Torah study all in one evening; what could be better? "And what it rains?" you ask. We'll find another evening this spring or early summer. Hope you can join us.


