# Hakarot hatov: Recognizing the good for a good new year

# **FROM THE** RABBI'S STUDY

Mishkan Ha'Nefesh, the High Holy Days prayerbook we have been using for the past few years, introduced a profound idea to approaching the spiritual challenge of the season we are about to enter. The overall emphasis of the Days of Awe is on

atonement, addressing our shortcomings by recognizing the hurt we have caused and changing the behavior that

leads to such harm. Historically, the liturgy for the High Holy Days pursues this goal with prayers that enumerate an array of wrongdoings and offer deep contrition for all

The editors of our new prayerbook did not cut back on the classic components. Aveinu Malkeinu (Our Creator, Our Ruler), "we have sinned before you," is still there. Al Chevt She Chatanu (the sins we have sinned against You) is still there. Ashamnu, an alphabetical litany of our sins, is still there. Kol Nidre, a prayer acknowledging the limitations of our capacity to change, is still there. Unatonatokeph, reminding us that judgment and

Join the congregation as we celebrate the new year, cast off our misdeeds, and enjoy one another's company directly after Rosh Hashanah services on Saturday, Sept. 16, and again on Sunday, Sept. 17.

The site of the Saturday event has not been finalized. Look for details in upcoming emails.

On Sunday, it's the return of Tashlich on the Creek, a 2- to 3-hour fun float by canoe or kayak. Participants are expected to be on-site at least 20 minutes before the 2 p.m. start time at Canoe Kentucky in Peaks Mill, northeast of Frankfort. Peaks Mill is a 40- to 60-minute drive from Lexington. The cost is \$65 for a canoe for two people (third person weighing less than 85 pounds is an additional \$10), \$50 for a one-person kayak, and \$75 for a tandem kayak; 3-, 4- or 5-person rafts are available, water level permitting, for \$85, \$110 and \$135, respectively. accountability are inescapable, is still there.

The editors did not cut back on the problem of sin, the pressing need for confession or otherwise water down the seriousness of the occasion. What they have done, through the inclusion of Hakarat Hatov – Recognizing the Good, is to offer a measure of balance and proportion to the demanding work of atonement. Tradition calls on us to engage in *heshbon nefesh*, an accounting of the soul. Until recently, this practice has implied an accounting of sins - where we have failed and what we have done wrong. Yet, to draw on the bookkeeping metaphor, a comprehensive accounting must

include credits as well as debits, gains and losses. A *heshbon nefesh* is not complete without a *hakarat hatov*.

A footnote in Mishkan Ha'Nefesh helps to put the balance between our good deeds and poor choices in proper perspective. Recognizing the good "conveys a moral lesson: that we find blessing not only in receiving something beneficial but in noticing and appreciating the good that is already ours." The purpose of hakarat hatov is not found in attaining gold stars or brownie points that might offset our offenses. The point of the exercise is not to get something from God or our fellow human beings. The objective, rather, is noticing and appreciating the goodness around us. The benefit of the exercise is found in looking for the good, not listing it.

When we take the effort to *look* for the good, the moral/spiritual opposite of fault-finding, we enhance our capacity for gratitude and optimism, and lessen our susceptibility to cynicism and despair.

As we prepare for the High Holy Days, and throughout the year, let us enhance the practice of *heshbon nefesh* with that of *hakarat hatov*. Let us strive to look a bit harder, longer, deeper and wider for the good in one another and in the world. For when we actually take the time to notice and appreciate the good that is already ours, we enhance our capacity and willingness to help it grow even further

May noticing goodness increase our goodness in the year to come.



# TAI'S ENDOWMENT AT WORK

TAI's endowment supplements the temple's financial needs. Many of the more than 30 funds that comprise the endowment were set up with a specific purpose in mind by the congregants who created and initially funded them. Disbursements from those funds must comply with the establishing agreements.

The information that follows, compiled by Endowment Committee Treasurer Stacey Myers-Wilson, covers the first half of 2023. It shows how the endowment is faring and how the funds are being spent to benefit TAI.

From Jan. 1 through June 30, the cumulative value of the endowment grew 9.3%. During that time, disbursements have been made as follows to meet temple needs:

- \$16,500 from Enrichment Fund; offset operating expenses.
- \$8.4K from Preschool Reserve Fund (comprised of budget surpluses over the years from the now-defunct preschool); remaining cost of paving former outdoor playground space.
- \$6.7K from Rosenstein Family Fund; offset Religious School operating expenses.

- \$6.1K from Dr. Sherman E. and Fannie H Miller Memorial Fund; youth activities and scholarships.
- \$5K from Jayne Bolotin Memorial Fund; cover TAI's insurance deductible from storm damage in August 2022.
- \$3.1K from the Marty Solomon Fund for Jewish Youth Experiences and General Fund Purposes; 2022-23 tuition offset for Religious School families.
- \$2.5K from Music & Worship Fund; offset cost of musician in residence position.
- \$2.1K from Skuller-Cohen-Cerel Endowment Fund; cost of Religious School curriculum.
- \$1.6K from Anita and Harold Baker Music Trust Fund; offset cost of April concert of Moroccan Jewish music.
- \$1.1K from Perpetual Care Fund; care of nine gravesites at Lexington Cemetery.
- \$1K from Tikkun Olam Fund; replenish L'Chaim Fund, which helps congregants facing financial struggles.
