A Hanukkah *Hallel* amid war

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



David Wirtschafter The ongoing war in Israel and Gaza fills us with heartbreak and loss. Like the first year of losing a loved one, the war has taken on a timetable of its own. The first Shabbat during the war, the first life-cycle events during the war, the first Veterans Day during

the war, the first Thanksgiving during the war, and now the first Hanukkah during the war.

The story of Hanukkah is rooted in war. Yet we turn to Hanukkah for light and faith at a time of darkness and despair. Hannukah invites us to look beyond grim realities

and renew our hope in miracles. The holiday urges us to believe that deliverance is possible, and redemption is achievable. The rabbis assigned us with the recitation of *Hallel* (Psalms of Praise) for Hanukkah just as they did for the festivals of Sukkot, Passover and Shavuot. An interesting decision for a holiday that does not appear in the Torah or require a cessation from work. Rabbi Yair Kahn explains that the rationale for this comes from the Talmud. We recite *Hallel*, throughout Hanukkah "because of the miracle."

We need a few modern miracles now. So let us offer *Hallel* that the remaining hostages, held in captivity since Oct. 7, be released. Let us offer *Hallel* that God may grant the miracle of ending more than seven decades of violent

and to say hello again to all the people who have been an important part of my life for almost a decade. The holiday season always makes me reflect on years past and the memories that have come to be the cornerstone of my family's life in Lexington. Thanksgiving or familiar with the many Southern colloquialisms that leave us Northerners scratching our heads, I have found a place of comfort and shared values here.

From 2016 to 2021, my involvement at TAI included being the Religious School director and co-cirector, then working as TAI's marketing and development director. While

those roles were unique in their job descriptions, they were alike in that I learned very quickly how much TAI means to so many families. I witnessed the love of generations passing on traditions while creating their own. I witnessed the compassion of a rabbi who approaches every situation with care and consideration. My heart is with TAI, and people with Jewish backgrounds all over the world, in hope that peace will come and the message of tikkun olam will be heard near and far.

MLK Shabbat includes speaker, social action

She is an associate professor of history and director of African American and Africana Studies at the University of Kentucky, and serves as director of the Central Kentucky Slavery Initiative.

Republic. The book also was shortlisted for the MAAH Stone Book

Award. Her work has been published in Slavery and Abolition: A Journal of Slave and Post-Slave Studies, Perspectives on History, Process: A Blog for American History, and The Rumpus.

As director of the Central Kentucky Slave Initiative, Holden leads efforts that include the Digital Access Project, aimed at digitizing and making accessible Fayette County's deed books in partnership with a team of UK scholars, local government, the Blue Grass Community Foundation, and descendant community members.

when things started changing for the
better, when the fighting abated,
when the dead could be buried, when
the wounded could be treated, when
captives were returned home, and
when people renewed their faith in
the notion that, despite the brutal
reality of war, we may realize the
beautiful miracle of peace.
