The climactic portions of Exodus in our annual Torah reading cycle are a good opportunity to follow up on a request the Music and Worship Committee and I are making of the entire congregation to attend Shabbat evening services and Saturday morning study sessions more often. The story of liberation and commandment to keep Shabbat are powerful reminders of the importance Judaism places on this holy day that happens every week. Torah teaches us about the day of rest even before humanity is instructed not to physically harm one another, not to steal, not to deceive. Our sacred texts do not wait until entering into the Promised Land to start talking about Shabbat.

Challah Prince takes braided bread to the next level — and beyond

Idan Chabasov, the self-proclaimed Challah Prince, will bring his elaborate braiding artistry, right, to Lexington on Wednesday, Feb. 7. During the interactive event, starting at 6:30 p.m. in the Mersack & Stern Social Hall at Temple Adath Israel, Chabasov will talk about and demonstrate his challah-making skills.

Additionally, attendees will get to braid their own challahs (dough will be provided) that can be taken home to bake.

"I aspire to spread challah to every person across the globe," Chabasov, a native of Tel Aviv, writes on his LinkedIn page. "What started as a small Instagram account soon became an ever-growing community of art, creativity, positivity, and deliciousness. ... My mission is to bring art into the baking world and demonstrate the beauty of every piece" of challah.

Chabasov, who has a background in professional dancing, video production, animation, art, and public relations in the lifestyle industry, says making challah "is not just about mixing a few ingredients into a bowl. It's a therapeutic process one goes through without even realizing it: one has to learn to enjoy the process and to be in the moment, even if the results are not as expected. My vision is simple — to follow the challah braid wherever it leads."

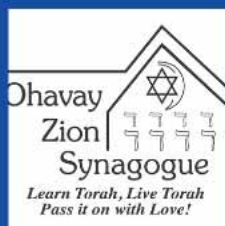

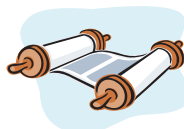
KOLLEL STUDY GROUP

The sabbath is so integral to human identity that God models its importance for humans days after creating them. "God blessed the seventh day and declared it holy, because on it God ceased from all the work of creation that God had done." Shabbat is only one of the obligations that appear in the Ten Commandments, articulated first in Exodus and again in Deuteronomy. But Shabbat is unique in that it is something God not only preaches but practices. God cannot model honoring parents because God has none. God cannot model "you shall not steal" because God has no need of material possessions. God cannot model "you shall not bear false witness" because God cannot be put on trial. Shabbat is a mitzvah so important even God has to do it.

Modeling constructive behavior is not easy. It is far easier to talk a good game about patience, generosity, compassion and open-mindedness than it is to demonstrate these values by example. Yet when things are modeled consistently, we have the power to transform the culture of classrooms, boardrooms and staffrooms. The same is true of the sabbath. When we model its importance

for one another, we provide a level of encouragement that words alone cannot convey. The more your friends believe that you are going to be at services, the more likely they are to attend, and vice versa. We know we will have succeeded in our goal when it is our mutual expectation to see one another at Temple.

This applies not only to services but to our Shabbat morning study sessions. The 9 a.m. conversations on a variety of topics and the 11 a.m. study of the week's Torah portion rely on active participation. The more people in attendance, the richer the conversation.

Make this the year you attend more often, sign up to lead a session, and encourage your friends and family to do likewise. When people see that you value services and study sessions enough to make them a priority, it encourages them to keep coming and keep learning, too.

A culture of mutual reinforcement takes time to be self-sustaining. Changing behavior patterns is not easy. Nothing worth doing is. What I can promise you, however, is that if everyone commits to making this a personal priority, the energy level and sense of joy and fulfillment we experience when we are here will be deeply and widely felt.
