Astounding August: 5 Sabbaths, Tisha B'Av

This August promises to be an astounding one at TAI, with five sabbath evening services and our annual commemoration of Tisha B'av.

Services will start at 6 p.m. with the exception of Aug. 2, when the start time is 7. The speaker that evening will be Dr. Karen Petrone, a TAI congregant who is a history professor at the University of Kentucky. The service will acknowledge the work of statewide Holocaust educators. Karen is co-director of the University of Kentucky-Jewish Heritage Fund Holocaust Education Initiative. Song leaders will be Jerry Suhl and Lauren Hill. Recently retired as a Fayette County teacher, Lauren has been named TAI's music coordinator

How did I get here? Let me tell you

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Dr. Mark Schachman, director of the Advanced Program in Endodontics at the University of Kentucky, was installed as TAI president at the annual meeting July 21. Here is an abridged version of his speech, which began with thanks to outgoing president Rich Ornstein:

Let me introduce myself by quoting the respected 20th century Talmudic scholar Jerome Garcia, who said, "What a strange long trip it's been." I ask myself today, "What is an Orthodox kid from Newark doing in a Reform temple in Kentucky?"

After 25 years in a solo endodontics practice in New Jersey, I ventured into academia with the support of my wife, Laura, and girls Leah and Danit. We said goodbye to the Garden State to spend two years in Richmond, Va., where I directed undergraduate endodontics at Virginia Commonwealth University. Then came a call from the dean of UK's College of Dentistry about developing an endodontic residency program. I said thank you, hung up and got out a map to see where Kentucky is.

Laura researched schools and temples in Lexington. Wanting to help, my sister informed me there wasn't a huge selection of temples. But after spending 30 minutes on the phone with Laura Creamer, TAI's administrator at the time, my sister advised us to check out the Reform

temple. Fast forward six years, and I'm TAI's president.

Many individuals were thanked today. Volunteers, you all make a difference. Your generosity has had a profound impact on the lives of those you touch. The tangible impact of your labor is evident, but it's the intangible — the kindness, compassion and empathy — that transforms lives. I say *todah rabah*, thank you, not for what you have done but for what you will do. So, with that in mind ...

When you are asked to donate a winter coat, make sandwiches, or prepare first aid and hygiene kits for the homeless and hungry, I say to you *todah rabah*.

When you are asked to lead a service, prepare a *d'var Torah*, or take on a reading, I say to you *todah rabah*.

When you are asked to visit or take a meal to an ailing congregant, I say to you *todah rabah*.

When our Religious School asks you to teach, read to our children or bake challah, hamantaschen or rugelach, I especially say to you *todah rabah*.

When you plan or attend TAI events, I say to you *todah rabah*.

When Nick Fain asks you to do anything, I say to you *todah rabah*.

President John F. Kennedy, once said: "We must find time to stop and thank the people who make a difference in our lives." You have made that difference in my life and that of my family.

A special *todah rabah* to former TAI president Deb Nelson, who first asked me to sit on the board. I wondered if I was capable; she took my hand, felt for a pulse and said, "You have what it takes."

Todah rabah to Rabbi Wirtschafter, who has become my sounding board, spiritual advisor and good friend. I look forward to working with you.

If you need me, I'm available. I appreciate everyone's thoughts and concerns. When I don't know something, I ask questions, then I listen and ask more questions. I look forward to your questions.

Todah rabah to everyone.

and serves as associate director of the UK-JHF Holocaust Education Initiative. We are so grateful to Karen and Lauren, along with their supporters from UK and JHF, for the hard work and dedication that goes into fulfilling the statewide mandate to provide Holocaust education for grades 7-12. Holocaust Remembrance Day is once a year, but the work of Holocaust education is a year-round effort that requires constant energy and attention to be successful. Along with Karen's message, the service will include songs and readings pertaining to the Shoah.

Services on Aug. 9 will be led by Lauren Hill and accompanist Harold Sherman, with prayer reading and Torah commentary by David Shraberg. David is a former TAI president, semi-retired psychiatrist, husband, father, and grandfather who brings remarkable wisdom and a sense of humor to everything he does.

Tisha B'av, a solemn day of mourning commemorating the destruction of the first and second Temples in Jerusalem, will be observed on Monday, Aug. 12, at Ohavay Zion Synagogue. The book of Lamentations will be chanted along with dirges reflecting the impact of that the 9th of Av has had throughout the history of our people.

At our Aug. 16 service, music will be provided by

instrumentalists and vocalists Aviva and Lew Bowling. This Family Sing-Along Shabbat will offer familiar melodies and an up-tempo pace. We always want attendees to participate, but we hope you'll make an even more pronounced effort for this service. Prayer reading and Torah commentary that evening will be offered by newly sworn-in temple president Mark Schachman, a professor of dentistry at UK and a former Religious School teacher. Mark brings a love of Torah and prayer to every service he's involved with.

Dr. Francie Chassen-López of UK will be our guest speaker at services Aug. 23. Her topic will be the recent historic victory of Claudia Sheinbaum, the first woman and first person of Jewish heritage to be elected president of Mexico. A scholar of history, Latin America, and gender and women's studies, Chassen-López is sure to bring a wealth of information and insight to this subject. Music that evening will be provided by Shir Adat.

Rounding out this lineup of services is Arts Shabbat on Aug. 30. Music will be led by Past-President Jonathan Miller and "kid-in-law" Gabriel Robitaille. Special readings will be coordinated by poet and arts enthusiast Lisa Miller in collaboration with various TAI writers and literature lovers.

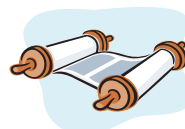
KOLLEL STUDY GROUP

TAI MISSION STATEMENT

Temple Adath Israel is a Reform Jewish congregation linked to a tradition of welcoming those searching for a community committed to honoring the dignity we all share as children of the one God by embracing these enduring Jewish values: *AVODAH* (Worship); *TALMUD TORAH* (Torah Study); *TZEDEK* (Social Justice); and *KEHILAH* (Community). Our mission is to inspire our congregants' Jewish engagement and to ensure a vibrant Jewish present and future by nurturing the many generations of our community.

We share a commitment to the Reform Jewish foundational beliefs of furthering individual and communal spiritual growth, while recognizing a range of personal philosophies, practices and needs. We are the community center through which our families can celebrate faith, justice, and the blessings of family lives present and future.

TAI'S ENDOWMENT AT WORK

The cumulative value of TAI's endowment, which supplements the temple's financial needs, grew 5.86% in the first half of 2024. Based on information compiled by Endowment Committee Treasurer Stacey Myers-Wilson, disbursements were made as follows to help meet the temple's needs through June 30:

- \$27,900 from Enrichment Fund; offset operating expenses.
- \$14K from Hineni Fund; offset operating expenses.
- \$12K from Rosenstein Family Fund; offset cost of Religious School tuition.
- \$11.6K from Building Fund; offset cost of chiller repair, architecture fees for hall leading to sanctuary.
- \$10.3K from Skuller-Cohen-Cerel Fund; Shabbat family dinners, Religious School security fees and curriculum.
- \$6K from Marty Solomon Fund for Jewish Youth

Experiences and General Fund Purposes; offset cost of LiveControl and Religious School tuition.

- \$3.6K from Dr. Sherman E. and Fanny H. Miller Memorial Fund; camp scholarships.
- \$3K from Bloomfield Family Fund; offset cost of LiveControl.
- \$3K from Rose Family Fund; offset cost of LiveControl.
- \$1.1K from Perpetual Care Fund; care of nine gravesites at Lexington Cemetery.
- \$500 from Cindy Jennings Kline Memorial Fund; camp scholarships.
- \$200 from Irving Gail Memorial Fund; programming expenses; Religious School expenses.
- \$200 from Maurice, Evelyn and Barbara Hymson Adult Education Trust Fund; programming expenses.
