Sing unto God a new song

The psalm we sing each Shabbat urges us to “sing unto God a new song.” What makes this year’s High Holy Days different than those before is not only new songs but a new singer.

After many years of dedicated service, Lorne Dechtenberg, our musician in residence, left TAI to take a job in California. After a nationwide search and careful deliberation, our Music and Worship Committee and Board of Directors hired Holli Berman, formerly of congregation Har HaShem in Boulder, Colo., to serve as our cantorial soloist for the High Holy Days.

Holli brings soulfulness and precision to a range of musical styles. This year’s High Holy Days will include a healthy mix of traditional songs, well-known folk melodies, and pieces

Now that I've a little time to settle in my new position, I need to acknowledge those who have preceded me and have given so much of their time and energy in making what TAI is today and shaping its future. To the former members of the Executive Committee and board, thank you for your contributions and guidance. To our current Executive Committee and board, we have a

great foundation to continue to build on. Let us continue to develop what has been given to us.

I always remember Labor Day weekend as a conclusion for some activities and a new start for others. Our summer activities of travel, camps and vacations needed to come to an end. Growing up in New Jersey, we started school after Labor Day, which meant shopping for clothes and school supplies. We looked forward to meeting our new teachers and making new friends. We would tell each other what we were going to do differently and our new goals. But first we wanted to know how many school days we would miss for the High Holy Days.

Rosh Hashanah was our starting line and for the next 10 days we raced toward renewal. I used to tell my non-Jewish friends that instead of weekly personal confessions we save everything up for one big day of confessions. When we recite our confessional, "*Al cheit*," and strike our hearts, we ask for forgiveness on behalf of our community and people as a whole and not just for ourselves. Rabbi Israel Meir Kagan taught: "God does not forgive us when we strike our hearts; rather, we are forgiven when our heart strikes us – that is, when we feel the pangs of conscience for our wrongdoing."

At Temple Adath Israel we have started our renewal by addressing some of our current needs and acting as a community to address them. We also consider what TAI will look like in its next 100 years. Our kitchen volunteers made great strides in a deep cleaning project that resulted in the display of our TAI history in the case between the doors to the Mersack & Stern Social Hall. Our grounds are getting a freshening up, and work to restore our permanent sukkah is moving forward. Religious School is under way, and our Sunday mornings are filled with students, teachers and friends sharing stories and thoughts.

Rosh Hashanah invites us to reflect, repent and embrace the chance to start anew. As the shofar sounds, it calls us to awaken our souls, seek forgiveness, and embark on a path of transformation. As we travel to the finish line, may these 10 Days of Repentance inspire us to repair our relationships and pave the way for a year filled with growth, compassion and reawakening.

On behalf of myself and family, I wish our TAI family a sweet year filled with happiness, health and renewal.

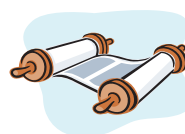
KOLLEL STUDY GROUP
