## For the miracles: high hopes of Hanukkah

Critical thinking would have us be doubtful about the existence of miracles. Divine intervention might make for a good story, but outcomes are more likely to be grounded in rational explanations.

The Hannukah blessing *Al Ha'Nisim*

(For the Miracles), which we are encouraged to sing each night after the candle lighting, invites us to think about things less literally. “For the miracles, wonders, marvels, salvation and deliverances You granted to our ancestors” does not ask us to recognize any particular claim of the Hannukah story as a fact. Rather, it invites us to think about miracles as a feeling.

In the rabbinic view, defeating the Greek-Assyrians (Seleucid dynasty) is not reducible to a set of geopolitical data points. It is about the possibility of outcomes that are better than circumstances initially suggest. It is about holding on to hope even when things seem hopeless. “Miraculous” means an occasion calls not only for critical assessment but profound gratitude.

The fragility of the cease-fire between Israel and Hamas, reduction in SNAP benefits, and fights over congressional redistricting have left many feeling on edge. Hannukah is a reminder that things are not always as bleak as they might seem. Change is possible. Remaining hopeful is no guarantee of success, but abandoning it is to ensure defeat.

May the lights of Hannukah reignite our love of wonders, miracles and marvels. And may we remain dedicated to achieving modern miracles of our own.

years ago, a group of dedicated individuals laid the foundation for a spiritual home that has nurtured generations. Just as Hanukkah connects us to our ancient heritage, our centennial connects us to the vision and commitment of those who came before us. ## **New Belin endowment fund will benefit TAI youth**

A new endowment fund has been established at Temple Adath Israel thanks to the generosity of Robert and Jo Belin, who have been TAI members for decades.

The Belin Family Youth Endowed Enrichment Fund will provide financial support to enhance Jewish life for temple youth, including the cost of Religious School camps, retreats and other events. It also may be used for physical enhancements to Religious School classrooms.

The fund will be administered by the Belin family, who will approve the expenditures. Money in the fund will be invested and overseen by the Endowment Committee in keeping with temple bylaws. Donations to the fund may be made by any individual, corporation, foundation, trust, estate or other legal entity through gifts, bequests or other gift vehicles.

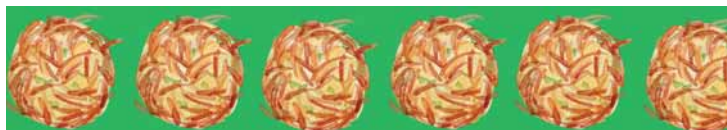

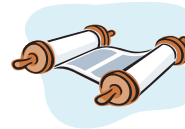
### KOLLEL STUDY GROUP
