A century ago, the board of our congregation took the bold step of leaving their Maryland Avenue location for our current home on Ashland Avenue. It was the Roaring Twenties, a time of growth and prosperity for many Americans, including American Jews. Women had recently won the right to vote. Jewish Americans were making gains into society in ways that their parents only could have dreamed of. Kentucky Jews could take pride in having one of our own on the U.S. Supreme Court. A new synagogue just a few blocks from the Henry Clay Estate and about a mile east of the courthouse announced that we intended to be more than tolerated, and were ready, willing and able to have

Spring, Jewish values share deep connection

I spent the first day of spring outside enjoying a 70-degree day while cleaning our temple grounds. I witnessed our garden volunteers starting to work and children playing on the lawn. Our temple is starting to take on a new look. I hope this weather continues ... it makes me feel good. I still leave for work in the dark, but

the end of the day offers more light, inviting people outside. Spring is a season of renewal – not just in nature, but in rhythm, mood and daily life. I see my neighbors walking in the streets not afraid of slipping on ice. The basketball hoops are up, and bicycles share the road. There was more traffic today, but cars were turning into the parks and not their driveways.

Warmer weather brings with it a simple but profound pleasure: the ability to be outside comfortably again. Coats are traded for light jackets, and eventually for short sleeves. Fresh air moves through homes that have been sealed tight against the cold. The smell of earth returns, along with budding trees and the first hints of green pushing through the soil.

With these changes comes a natural shift in how people work and spend their time. Tasks that once felt confined

indoors begin to migrate outside. Laptops appear on patios, notebooks are carried to park benches, and phone calls are taken while walking instead of sitting.

This season also coincides with Passover, a holiday deeply rooted in themes of renewal, freedom, growth and reflection, and the opportunity to start fresh. Just as spring marks a natural reawakening, Passover invites a spiritual one. Families gather to share meals rich with symbolism, retelling stories that connect past struggles with present gratitude. The timing feels fitting as the world outside comes back to life. So, too, does a sense of connection – to history, to tradition and to one another.

Springtime and Jewish values share a deep connection. Values such as appreciating life's blessings, caring for others and remembering history are central during this time. The blossoming world mirrors the hope embedded in Jewish teachings – a reminder that repair is always possible and that even after hardship, growth and transformation can emerge with strength and purpose.

Spring's arrival is not loud or abrupt, but its effects are undeniable. It reshapes routines, lifts spirits and invites people to step outside – literally and figuratively. Whether working under the sun, sharing meals in the open air or gathering for meaningful traditions, the season offers a gentle reminder: Life expands when we allow ourselves to follow the light.

Spring symbolizes new beginnings, a reminder that life constantly moves through different seasons, each with its own purpose.

"For everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven." (Ecclesiastes 3:31).

MUSIC NOTES

My mom’s family fled the pogroms in Poland and settled in Rochester, NY, in the latter part of the 19th century. Their generation brought with them music from our Reform tradition that, in its time, was as radical as Elvis or The Beastie Boys. Composers like Cantor Salomon Sulzer, inspired by the Enlightenment and Vienna’s religious music scene, composed Jewish classical choral music that brought our ancient tradition into the modern world of the 1820s. Men and women sang together (a SHOCKING development) in multipart arrangements meant to inspire awe and to make use of the remarkable acoustics created by the high ceilings of Reform sanctuaries. Composers such as Lewis Lewandowski and Abraham Wolf Binder extended this tradition, creating a century of Jewish choral masterpieces that dominated our tradition until the 1960s, when folk music crashed onto the scene.

Accompanied by our organ, congregants in 1926 would have enjoyed these arrangements in our new sanctuary. To mark 100 years on North Ashland Avenue, Shir Adat, our all-volunteer choir, has worked hard since February to learn some of those arrangements to re-create this

experience for our Throwback Shabbat service on April 10. In addition to arrangements from Sulzer and Binder, you will hear Franz Schubert’s composition of Psalm 92 (I a work inspired by Schubert’s friendship and admiration for Cantor Sulzer. We cordially invite you to share in this unique experience with us.

My grandparents chose to assimilate as much as possible in their new country. They celebrated Christmas and worked on the Sabbath. They prioritized safety above Jewish practice. My sister and I reclaimed our family’s Jewish tradition because of our strong connections to our B’nai B’rith Youth Organization community. We felt empowered in the ’80s to live openly as Jews. Yet today, I know many of us hide our necklaces or keep our affiliation private in this fear-infused climate. Safety again trumps tradition. We must again find an antidote to this fear and isolation in community. Each Friday night, we come together to celebrate the Sabbath, to light candles, to sing our prayers of gratitude and peace. Just showing up is an act of courage and love. Reassert your commitment to Jewish practice and community and come sing with us. We need one another now – and always.

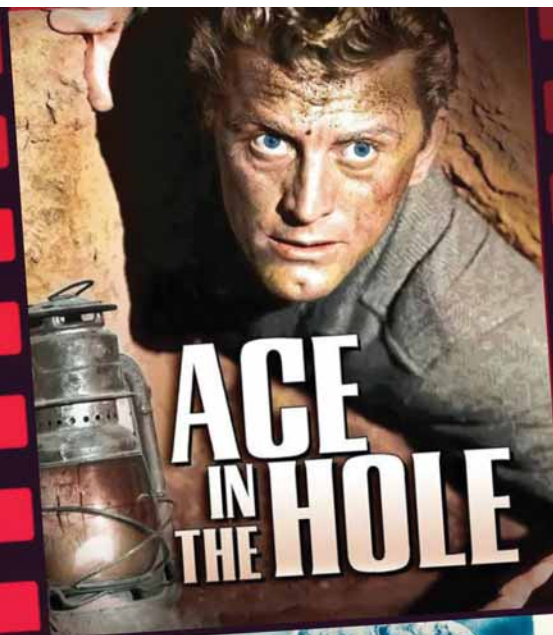

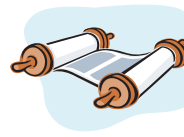
KOLLEL STUDY GROUP

a seat at the table of social, economic and cultural leadership.

This year we celebrate not only the 100th anniversary of our presence on Ashland Avenue but more than 120 years of service to Lexington and its environs. It is an honor to stand on the pulpit graced by such courageous rabbis and scholars as Jacob Rader Marcus, Joseph Rosenbloom, William Leffler and Marc Kline. It is a privilege to be part of a congregation that contributes to our community through medicine, law, business, education, teaching, writing, research and the arts.

We owe a debt of gratitude to founding generations who showed us

the way, people who built a congregation that provides a place for the spiritual, social, intellectual and emotional needs of our community. They endured a degree of resistance, resentment and reluctance that few of us have experienced. They endured the Great Depression, two world wars and a pandemic far worse than what we went through. Without a temple, it is extremely difficult for a town to recruit – and retain – people who care about Judaism. We have a temple because they built one, maintained one and sacrificed for one.

On Friday, April 10, we will honor the vision, dedication and leadership of the generation that made the transition from Maryland Avenue to Ashland Avenue with a Shabbat service much along the lines of one they would have

held. Our text will be from a Union Prayer Book of the 1920s. Many of the melodies we will sing will be of that era. We encourage you to dress up for services with a sense of decorum that people did during that time. Please make every effort to attend this special service and encourage friends and family to do likewise.
